

She is married to her soul mate and best friend, Jonathon Romain, and proud mother to the lovely Kennedy Alexandra Romain.





First Pillar: Empowering Children Through Arts

Foundational Guidelines of Our Arts Education Pillar

- Big Picture believes that children benefit from learning arts taught by professional artists.
- We partner with Peoria Public Schools, Peoria Park District, and ART Inc utilizing their enrollment and physical spaces.
- Big Picture pays the teaching artists and provides the supplies.

Accomplishments

- Partnered with Peoria Public Schools, Peoria Park District on creating over 1000 square feet of murals created by arts students.
- Sponsored a month-long filmmaking class at the Romain Arts and Culture Community Center.
- Sponsoring an ongoing filmmaking class at Romain Arts and Culture Community Center.
- Funded nine professional artists funded to teach.
- Responsible for the creation of four murals in Peoria Public Schools.
- Hosted the Little Big Picture Student Team Painting Challenge.
- Sponsored the Back to the Future mural project with Peoria Park District .
- Furnished the filmmaking classroom at the Romain Center with 10 iMac computers, cameras, and sound equipment.
- Collaborated with Peoria County Schools Supervisor to plan PeoriaPalooza teacher education day at Romain Center.
- Collaborated with Peoria Public Schools Superintendent and Fine Arts Coordinator to involve arts teachers in Big Picture's arts education opportunities.
- Supported the professional development of three interns and one professional artist.
- Provided a \$3000 grant for a Central Illinois filmmaker.





Little Big Picture Student Team Painting Challenge

- Seven student teams from schools in Peoria, East Peoria, and Metamora participated in the Little Big Picture Student Team Painting Challenge at this year's street festival.
- The students arrived at the festival at 9 am and the word "unity" was pulled from a hat as the theme for their murals. (The concept words in the hat were all written by teachers at Peoria Public Schools and Peoria County Schools.)
- The student teams had 5 hours to conceive and create their mural.
- Completed murals were judged by nationally renown artist Carrie Pearce and trophies and gift certificates for art supplies were awarded.











Filmmaking Classes

- Summer School Class Taught by Keenan Dailey, U of I master student.
- Fall Semester Class Taught by Filmmaker Giovanni Galindo.
- Students learn basics of filming, animation, sound recording, and make their own short films.
- Big Picture funds the teaching arts.
- Big Picture installed 10 iMac computers, 10 iPads as recording devices, sound equipment, and vidoegrapher tools in a film lab classroom at the Romain Arts and Culture Community Center.

- In summer 2019, Beth Crider, Superintendent of Peoria County Schools, contacted Big Picture about providing supportive workshops and interactions with the county's fine art teachers. Beth was interested in having the workshop hosted at the Romain Arts and Culture Community Center.
- Big Picture and the Romain Center rose to the occasion and involved ArtsPartners of Central Illinois, the Peoria Symphony Orchestra, Peoria Drum Circle, and the Peoria Art Guild on planning a full workshop day.
- Beth Crider gave all of us overwhelming positive feedback after the event and wants to repeat the experience in 2020.



- Big Picture offered paid work-experience internships for three Bradley graphic arts students.
- Students were given guidance and support by professional artists.
- Students designed and created signs, posters, and ads for the Big Picture Film Festival and Big Picture Peoria Street Festival.
- Big Picture funded the summer residency of Bradley instructor Heather Brammeier to the International Studio and Curatorial Program (ISCP). ISCP supports the creative development of artists and curators, and promotes exchange through residencies and public programs. Big Picture's support of Heather has given us exposure to international artists. ISCP is New York's most comprehensive visual arts residency program, and one of the largest in the world.
- Heather supported Big Picture's festival by creating a community mural to encourage public painting. She is now taking the mural to local high schools to continue the painting.
- Heather has produced new installation art in Peoria's Warehouse District on behalf of Big Picture.
- Big Picture offered a \$3000 grant to a Central Illinois filmmaker. A jury selected local filmmaker Connor Parkhurst. Connor created "Mowing Man" film that won the People's Choice Award at the Big Picture Film Festival.






Second Pillar: Hosting Annual Interactive Arts Festivals


Foundational Guidelines of Our Festival

Accomplishments

- Twice as many activites at the 2019 street festival.
- Twice as much attendance.
- Wide range of activities ranging from community mural painting to first-ever Peoria iron pour to performances by local schools and theaters to an original acoustic showdown.
- Film festival expanded to two days and included international and national filmmakers.

The Illinois Mutual Performance Stage featured local theater and school performers—Corn Stock Theater, Peoria Players Theater, P 14 Dance Academy, Nitsch Theater Arts, and PAPAS Vocal Velocity. The culminating act was a flash mob performed by the public.





99.9 fm WWCT and Peoria Music Live organized the Original Acoustic Showdown—an open-mic contest with 16 performers. Winners were chosen by popular vote. The afternoon was rounded out with four local favorite bands.



Dan Fogelberg, Peoria native, was the subject of this year's community paintby-number created by Doug Leunig. The mural is at Gabbert's Art Park, 1323 SW Adams. Local sculptor Monte de Gallo showcased all his animals at the festival.



Seven Central Illinois high schools and middle schools participated in the Little Big Picture Student Team Painting Challenge. At 9 am the concept word "unity" was pulled from a hat and student teams had 5 hours to conceptualize and create an 8'x4' mural. Winners were selected by a judge and trophies were awarded along with gift certificates. Murals will be displayed on the fence at the Peoria Zoo in partnership with the Peoria Park District.





Returning for their second year, BCAI of Bloomington offered breakdancing lessons along with performances.



Over 40 chalk artists from throughout Central Illinois created works in 6'x6' squares in the second annual Draw for a Cause. Draw for a Cause raises funds for arts education in community centers by gaining sponsors of the squares. Artists are awarded prizes based on popular public vote. 

Big Picture Film Festival



- The walkable film festival on the evening of October 11 welcomed special guest State Senator Chuck Weaver to the Studios on Sheridan. Senator Weaver awarded a \$1000 filmmaker grant to a Bradley student for her work in film.
- The Film Festival Awards Ceremony was held on the Giant Screen Theater at the Peoria Riverfront Museum.
- Over 70 local, national, and international films were entered.
- 39 films were shown at the Main Street walkable festival and the Best of at Peoria Riverfront Museum.
- Filmmakers from Australia, California, South Carolina, Chicago, Springfield, and Lincolnshire all came to Peoria.

Outcomes of the Festival

Street Festival

- 2 new public murals by professional artists on display in the Warehouse District at 1323 and 1311 SW Adams.
- A Richard Pryor mural to honor Peoria's most famous citizen.
- 7 new murals by students that will be displayed at the Peoria Zoo.
- Student painting teams had the chance to paint in the public for the first time and collaboratively created murals--a significant life event.
- 2 new public murals created by members of the community.
- New installation art in the Warehouse District.
- Strengthened collaboration with artists and arts organizations.
- Exposure for the businesses in the festival blocks and business for food vendors.
- A team of artists who believe in being part of creating Peoria's vibrancy.
- A dedicated team of more than 30 volunteers who spend 6 months planning the festival.
- Synergy created with people from all walks of life in our community.
- Exposure for sponsors to people from various walks of life.
- Donations by chalk square sponsors and the public to fund professional artists to lead students in creating 20' murals in Peoria Public Schools.
- Funding to continue the semester-long filmmaking classes being held at the Romain Center.
- The drumming circle gave people a sense of community that they don't often get to experience.
- Early childhood experiences in the KidZone freeform actitivites plant all kinds of ideas in the imagination.

Film Festival

- Support of budding filmmakers in Central Illinois through recognition at the festival--placemaking for local filmmakers.
- Opportunity for local filmmakers to be awarded two grants to make a film. Grants made possible by Community Foundation of Central Illinois and State Senator Chuck and Laurie Weaver.
- Awareness in the international filmmakers' community that Peoria is now on the festival list.
- The festival also provided international filmmakers with positive stories of Peoria to take back home with them.
- International social media exposure.
- Economic benefit to hotels from visiting filmmakers and business for restaurants and bars on Upper Main Street.

- Big Picture Initiative and the Peoria Art Guild collaborated on the creation and installation of two new murals on 420 SW Washington Street.
- Two new public murals were created by professional artists during the street festival and are on display at 1323 and 1311 SW Adams.
- Eleven new murals by students are displayed in Glen Oak Park at the Peoria Playhouse Children's Museum.
- Two new public murals created by members of the community and are on display at 1323 and 1212 SW Adams.
- New installation art in the Warehouse District at 1212 SW Adams.
- Big Picture helped fund an 8000-lumen projector for image mapping on outdoor buildings.

Accomplishments

- Big Picture produced a mural map highlighting the nearly 40 murals in Peoria. The map is housed on bigpicturepeoria.org
- Big Picture Initiative partnered with the new Ronald McDonald House to fill the house with art by local artists.
- Over 250 pieces of art were purchased by donors for the Ronald McDonald House, and artists were paid for their work rather than being asked to donate





Pillar Two: Arts Festival


- Continue to strengthen our partnerships with businesses, artists, and arts organizations.
