

Mural classes for students have been a staple of Big Picture Peoria since our inception in 2018. We have held summer school classes of 10 to 20 students for Peoria Public Schools and the Peoria Park District.

At St Thomas School, every single one of the 282 students had a hand in painting this mural. Preschoolers finger-painted stars while 8th graders did detail work. St Thomas School 8th grader Max Schmidt came up with the space concept for the mural, and artists Megan Couri and Connie Andrews created the design.










magazine issues created by students

From 2020 until May 2023, Big Picture Peoria published 31 magazine issues created by students who were paired up with mentors to foster their artistic abilities. The magazine focused on helping students find their voice, mentoring them in their passions, and paying them for their hard work. We thank the Gilmore Foundation for their generous support.

We believe the arts give students a voice—a voice often hidden in the quest for test scores and metric achievements. The arts fill a void for students by giving them a platform for self-expression and contributing to their environment. Big Picture Initiative's arts education programs focus mainly on the visual arts, but during the pandemic we decided to expand into the communication arts. By gaining experience in being more effective communicators and engaging with a public audience, students are being prepared for their place in the future.



Big Picture's very first mural, titled "Abraham Blue," was unveiled in 2018 to a large crowd at the Peoria County Courthouse, the location where Lincoln made his historic speech against slavery in 1854. It was a proud day for the City of Peoria and mural artist Doug Leunig because the mural, with various blue hues, was much more than a beautiful portrait honoring this historic event. The 50-foothigh face of Abraham Lincoln, who himself suffered greatly from depression throughout his life, was a statement about the importance of removing the stigma surrounding mental health issues.

"Abraham Blue 2023" is a striking and realistic digital image created by using a variety of apps, including artificial intelligence, throughout the creative process. Abe is also now able to communicate with viewers through augmented reality about Lincoln's significance at this very place in Peoria, as well as the important role the community played in helping Lincoln in his ongoing battle with depression.

Viewers of the mural can download an augmented-reality app and experience Lincoln talking about the speech he made at the Peoria County Courthouse in 1854, his ongoing bouts of melancholia, and how the people in his life helped him address his mental health challenges and rise above adversity.






Scan the QR code to get the augmented reality app. Once you have the app loaded, you can use the portrait to the right to launch the videos.





What do "Cerberus," an 1824 painting by William Blake of the three-headed monster guarding the underworld, and a family dog have in common? A lot when seen through the eyes of a young girl. Hazel, the daughter of the Fritch family, came home from fifth grade one day, opened her textbook to Blake's "Cerberus," and said, "This looks like Jack." Jack is the family dog and Hazel wasn't wrong. Jack does share some similar features with Blake's painting (minus the two extra heads of course).

The revelation led the Fritches to reach out to Big Picture Peoria to transform Jack into the legendary guard dog. The finished mural features photos of Jack and Hazel as well as a digital photo collage of the gates of the underworld.

"Now, we have our own Cerberus, guarding the neighborhood!" said Angela Fritch-Milton when the mural was mounted in December 2023.

Street festivals throughout the US are a big tourist draw. 2023 was Big Picture Initiative's third street festival and we welcomed hundreds of Peoria's as well as people from surrounding communities. As the only interactive arts festival in Central Illinois, we bring together people from different cultures, parts of our community, and ages for a day of smiles and art making that builds community.












Nearly 30 chalk artists and chalk artist teams from throughout Central Illinois created works in 6'x6' squares during the chalk art competition. Artists were awarded cash prizes based on popular public vote.

Artists taught workshops and conducted drop-in art projects using a variety of media, such as nontoxic dyeing, collage, clay relief, phone photography, poetry writing, metal bending, and using found and natural objects for art.









Peoria High School art students painted two murals during the festival. The murals now hang at their school.



CT Gabbert Art Park drew a crowd with its Doodle Wall, where the festival attendees could freely add to a 20'x10' mural.



The performance stage featured local theater and school performers, including Pleasant Valley School, Peoria Ballet, Peoria Players, Corn Stock Theatre, BCAI Cultural Arts, Nitsch Theatre Arts, V8Vastchange, and Eastlight Theatre.







students attended the Sun Foundation's 30th annual Clean Water Celebration.

Big Picture Peoria participated in the Sun Foundation's 30th Annual Clean Water Celebration by having two community murals. We started with two blank canvases made from NFW's CLARUS canvas and mixed all natural paints from powdered pigments and plant-based acrylic medium.

Students were invited to learn about the natural paints and CLARUS canvas and then help paint the murals.

CLARUS canvas is unique because the materials come from nature and can return to the earth as nutrients for future growth. Synthetic fabrics are a form of plastic that don't break down, so they are drowning the planet in textile waste.





The future of sustainable art is now, and we are honored to have strong partnerships in this movement. Thank you to the Sun Foundation, Natural Fiber Welding, Preston Jackson, Wild Routed, Connie Andrews, Brett Rhoades, Peoria High School, and our community for making this happen!



No petroleum products or plastic were used in the creation of the art.

Project 1612 was founded in 2015 by Jessica Bingham, Alexander Martin, and Zach Ott. The project, a short-term residency program lasting 4-6 days, provides artists time and space to interact with community and create an ephemeral exhibition that is free and open to the public.

Project 1612 seeks to support historically underrepresented artists, including women, BIPOC, and the LGBTQIA community. Since opening, Project 1612 has hosted traditional and experimental art forms, including painting, photography, video, performance, installation, sound- and time-based work, and viewer participatory projects.











INCOME SOURCES




ALLOCATION of FUNDS
